Due to COVID-19, all meeting attendees participated in the meeting via a computer or phone.

Call to Order: Steve called the meeting to order at 1:02 p.m.

<u>April 15, 2020 Minutes:</u> Dave moved to approve April 15, 2020 meeting minutes. Roby seconded. Steve noted a typo on page one; change 'delated' to 'delayed.' All were in favor. Nate was absent for the vote.

April 2020 Treasurer's Report: Dave reviewed the April 2020 Treasurer's Report:

- Checks numbering #19360 through #19402 dated between April 1, 2020 and April 30, 2019: \$133,324.88
- Credit card charges: \$591.98
- Net credits for the month: \$19,039.31
- Operating Reserves Account Balance: \$501,025.69
- Committed Funds Savings Account: \$231,219.13
- Reconciled General Fund Checking Balance: \$625,168.38

There was a brief discussion on changing the formatting of the second page of future Treasurer's Reports. Roby moved to approve the April 2020 Treasurer's Report. Bob seconded. All were in favor. Nate was absent for the vote.

Partner and Guest Reports and Public Comment:

Adam Clark (Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS)): Adam updated the board on ongoing irrigation projects noting assistance deadline for 2020 and requested that TCD inform NRCS of possible future projects.

<u>Renee Seidler (JH Wildlife Foundation)</u>: Renee thanked the board for the opportunity to introduce herself as the new Executive Director and is looking forward to working with TCD.

Board Reports: On behalf of Nate (who was absent for the first part of the meeting), Tom noted that Nate intends to run for reelection to the Teton Conservation District Board of Supervisors.

Staff Reports:

<u>Robb Sgroi (Land Resources Specialist)</u>: Action item 1. Kelly Bettner introduced herself as a parent on the Alta Elementary School Parent Teacher Organization (PTO) and garden cocoordinator. She provided the board with a garden update and summarized the financial request. **Dave moved to authorize funding for the Alta Elementary School PTO budget line item request in the amount of \$2,437 from the FY 2020 line item titled 'Indoor Agriculture,' from the TCD Agriculture Program Area. Roby seconded.** Jenna Beck, Principal of Alta Elementary School, thanked the board and said that the garden curriculum that TCD funded last year will be used in fall and winter 2020 classes. There was a clarifying discussion on why the grant application requests funds for incurred costs and future costs. **All were in favor.** Nate was absent for the vote.

Tom introduced Robb's second action item regarding Small Water Project Program (SWPP) agreements. Dave move to approve five agreements, and have the Chairman and Secretary provide countersignatures on each agreement. The five agreements are titled 1) Blackrock Creek Stabilization, Irrigation Improvement, and Habitat Enhancement Project; 2) Granite Creek Supplemental Ditch Headgate Improvement Project; 3) Horse Creek Fish Passage and Irrigation Improvement; 4) Lower Snake River Ranch Bank Stabilization and Fish Habitat Project; and 5) South Park Wildlife Habitat Management Area Wetland Enhancement Project. Bob seconded. All were in favor. Nate was absent for the vote.

Action item 3. Anna Senecal, Aquatic Habitat Biologist for the Wyoming Game and Fish Department (WGFD), addressed questions regarding the Game Creek SWPP project. Nate joined the meeting at 1:29. Bob restated his concerns about reserving irrigation water for the game wardens. Kyle Lash, WGFD Game Warden, joined the call and spoke in support of the project. **Dave moved to approve the Game Creek Irrigation System Improvement Agreement, and have the Chair and Secretary provide countersignatures on the agreement. Nate seconded the motion.** Bob introduced a friendly amendment that if the game warden's use of the water were to be limited, TCD's funding for the project should be refunded. There was discussion that this would delay the project and complicate the agreement. Anna said that her understanding of Wyoming water law is that there is no legal mechanism for a third party to redirect water under these circumstances. Nate agreed. Bob withdrew his friendly amendment. All were in favor.

Information items in Robb's written staff report that were not discussed included: the Natural Resources Conservation Service Local Work Group meeting, rangeland monitoring and management, the University of Wyoming Haub School Environmental Solutions program, Wildfire Risk Reduction Program updates, a forthcoming development review, and Robb's annual employee evaluation.

Emily Hagedorn-Wegher (Administrative Manager): Emily introduced a request from the Wyoming Association of Conservation Districts (WACD) for a contribution to their Legal Fund. **Dave moved to approve \$5,000 in funding as a partnering contribution to WACD's Legal Fund. Nate seconded.** There was a discussion on how much TCD spends on legal services annually and concerns regarding spending funds that do not go directly to natural resources. **All were in favor.**

Emily reported that at least three firms have expressed interest in submitting proposals to conduct the audit.

The Flat Creek Water Improvement District joint meeting with TCD will be held on June 17, 2020 in conjunction with TCD's regular meeting. Pending pandemic circumstances, the TCD July 2020 board meeting will tentatively take place in Alta, in conjunction with their annual community picnic. Dave is unavailable to attend the July 2020 meeting because he will be at the WACD meeting.

Information items in Emily's written staff report that were not discussed included: health insurance, staff transitions, quarterly reporting, Emily's annual employee evaluation, and FY 21 budgeting.

<u>Morgan Graham (GIS & Wildlife Specialist)</u>: Action item 1. Morgan talked about Teton Raptor Center's request for TCD's sponsorship of the 2020 Radio RaptorFest, which be held on KHOL 89.1. Morgan provided information on the success of their recent online educational efforts and outlined the sponsorship levels. TCD supported the event at the \$2,500 level last year. Phoebe, a board member of Teton Raptor Center, provided further background. **Nate moved to sponsor the 2020 Radio RaptorFest in the amount of \$2,500. Roby seconded. Nate, Steve, Roby and Dave voted in favor. Bob opposed.**

There was a conversation on reseeding disturbed areas within historical pastures with domesticated grass seed. Bob emphasized the value of clover. Nate stated he also uses a pasture grass mix. Morgan addressed a question regarding the lidar report and River Design Group.

Bob requested that two members of the public be able to attend the next meeting by phone to comment on wildlife collaring. They were encouraged to do so.

Information items in Morgan's written staff report that were not discussed included: The Nature Conservancy's Wildlife Conservation Society's Climate Adaptation Fund for the Rocky Mountain Native Plant Garden at National Museum of Wildlife Art, technical assistance for a homeowner in the Hoback River Subdivision, vegetation clearing, review of the National Elk Refuge Native Seeding project, discussions with Teton County Engineering, social media, Wildlife-Vehicle collisions data, Bridger Teton National Forest Teton Interagency Area Risk Assessment spatial data, and the Surface Water Inventory.

<u>Elyce Gosselin (Natural Resources Technician)</u>: This is Elyce's last week at TCD before she begins her PhD. The board and staff thanked Elyce for her high caliber of work. Elyce received a grant from the National Science Foundation for her upcoming research at the University of Idaho.

Information items in Elyce's written staff report that were not discussed included the Wildlife-Vehicle Collisions (WVC) Data Analysis.

<u>Carlin Girard (Water Resources Specialist and Associate Director)</u>: Carlin introduced an action item regarding the facilitation of the Hoback Drinking Water Stakeholder Group. **Dave moved to direct staff to decrease TCD's Teton County cost-share request for the Hoback**

Stakeholder Group facilitation to \$2,611.00 (10% of total facilitation costs). Roby seconded. There was agreement that staff should submit a written comment to the commissioners recognizing this action and other water quality efforts that TCD hopes the county can financially support in FY 2021. All were in favor.

Carlin discussed Protect Our Water Jackson Hole's (POWJH) request to Teton County to conduct wastewater planning. The Teton County Board of County Commissioners requested that POWJH resubmit an altered proposal that clarifies how their request relates to TCD's work and efforts by Town and County staff. There was discussion on whether TCD would support wastewater planning at the county level. Dave said that stormwater planning does not have to happen in conjunction with wastewater planning, and that if Teton County is in support of the effort, then TCD would be as well. Roby expressed concerns that this direction is lacking in comprehensive planning and Town of Jackson involvement. Carlin added that town staff have expressed strong interest in partnering. Because the effort includes both septic and sewer, Dave added that it won't be possible for the county to move forward without substantial town involvement. Carlin discussed the tentative funding timeline, which would span over fiscal years 2021-2023. The funding partners would include POWJH, Teton County, and TCD. Roby asked that the Town of Jackson be included as a non-monetary partner and key stakeholder. The board agreed that they were generally in support of this wastewater planning effort, emphasizing the importance of stakeholder involvement and clear expectations of roles and responsibilities. Dave expressed he would like to see a written synopsis of the proposal.

There was discussion on the cost-share request to the county for the septic effluent study. POWJH has offered to contribute \$18,000, requiring only \$2,000 from the county. There was discussion on Town of Jackson stormwater efforts, which include a \$250,000 stormwater study. Carlin mentioned that the Town of Jackson has been sampling the wastewater treatment plant for the presence of COVID-19. Tom congratulated Carlin on a letter received from the Wyoming Department of Environmental Quality that said the Flat Creek Watershed Management Plan is an outstanding resource.

Information items in Carlin's written staff report that were not discussed included: Septic Effluent Monitoring Study, Hoback Drinking Water Stakeholder Group, Well Test Kit Program, Trout Friendly Landscaper & Business Partner Certification, aquatic-crossings working group, Wyoming Association of Conservation Districts water quality monitoring recertification training, JH Public Art Cache Creek Daylight project, videoconference presentation to local fishing guides, and technician hiring process.

<u>Phoebe Coburn (Communications Specialist)</u>: Phoebe reported that she had been working with Morgan and Carlin on creating and releasing a new video series called Morgan's Nature Notebook. She submitted a grant to the Wyoming Association of Conservation Districts and the Wyoming Department of Agriculture for the Karns Meadow sign project. Roby congratulated Phoebe on the radio interview she did with KJAX 93.5.

Information items in Phoebe's written staff report that were not discussed included: the Long-Range Plan and Strategic Plan, Phoebe's annual employee evaluation, Field Notes, release of the spring Conservation Currents newsletter, the Trout Friendly Lawns Business Certification event, and Trout Friendly lawn sign delivery.

Tom Segerstrom (Executive Director):

Tom introduced an action item regarding the 2019 Region 8 Hazard Mitigation Plan. Roby moved to authorize Steve McDonald as Chair to sign the resolution to support the 2019 Region 8 Hazard Mitigation Plan with Roby as Secretary attesting to the signature. Dave seconded. All were in favor.

The draft 2020-2025 Long-Range Plan requires a 45-day public comment period. Roby provided amendments to Tom prior to the meeting, which will be included in the draft to be released to the public. Dave moved to approve the draft text for the Teton Conservation District 2020-2025 Long-Range Plan (as amended) for the required, 45-day public comment period. Nate seconded. Liz congratulated staff on the quality of the strategic plan and asked about additional opportunities to partner with other conservation districts. The motion passed.

Tom presented the third draft of the FY 2021 budget. At the end of the month, the budget will be submitted to the Wyoming Department of Agriculture. The final budget will be voted on at the June 2020 board meeting. Steve said he anticipates that line items will be adjusted throughout the year due to the nature of present circumstances. Tom discussed the partnering funds line item, which is anticipated to be about \$100,000—the exact amount will not be known until June 30, 2020. TCD staff reached out to town and county staff to discuss possible projects that could be supported by these funds. Town of Jackson submitted three potential projects: 1) wastewater planning 2) stormwater infrastructure, and 3) wastewater treatment process review and outreach.

Information items in Tom's written staff report that were not discussed included: personnel/working remotely, Teton County's FY 2021 budget process, the TCD Natural Resource Plan, Town and County Comprehensive Plan Amendments, Systems of Conservation (SysCon) Group, and Flat Creek Watershed Improvement District.

Executive Session: Roby Hurley moved to enter executive session under Wyoming State Statute 15-1-1-5 and 16-4-405 to discuss personnel matters at 3:36 p.m. Dave Adams seconded the motion. All were in favor. The Board dismissed all other meeting attendees from the Zoom meeting. Tom Segerstrom, Steve McDonald, Bob Lucas, Nate Fuller, Roby Hurley and Dave Adams remained present. Dave Adams moved to adjourn the executive session and resume the regular TCD meeting at 4:20 p.m. Roby Hurley seconded. All were in favor.

Steve called for a motion to formally ratify the Executive Session discussions. Dave Adams moved that wages be increased for TCD's Fiscal Year 2021 and incorporated into the FY 2021 budget as follows: Tom Segerstrom 1%, Emily Hagedorn-Wegher 1%, Phoebe Coburn 4%, Carlin Girard 2%, Robb Sgroi 2%, Morgan Graham 2%. Bob Lucas seconded the motion. With no further discussion, the motion passed unanimously with Nate Fuller absent. <u>Adjournment:</u> Dave moved to adjourn the regular TCD meeting at 4:40 p.m. Roby Hurley seconded the motion. All were in favor.

Program Area: Administration

• FY 2021 TCD Budget Hearing: As required, (and according to the Budget Hearing notice in the June 10, 2020 newspaper), the Budget Hearing will be called to order at 1:30pm and any public comment will be taken. The Hearing will be closed and the final Budget Approval will occur later in the Regular TCD Board Meeting. Once that point is reached, a motion for final approval of the TCD Fiscal Year 2021 will be asked for. Recommended Motion: Move to approve the TCD Fiscal Year 2021 Budget as discussed, with the final checking account carryover amount, and the partnering fund amount, to be determined at the end of fiscal year 2020, and recorded within the TCD and WY Department of Audit budget forms.

Information Items:

Program Area: Administration

- **TCD FY2021 Budget:** As part of the budgeting process, we are required to submit a "Mill Levy Request Letter" to the Teton County Commissioners. As indicated by our FY 2021 Budget, we will be requesting .85 of a mill from tax payers. I will circulate a letter for signatures that will then be delivered to the Teton County Treasurer.
- WY Dept. of Audit (DoA) Budget form: Completed! After the required amount of struggle, the DoA has accepted our FY21 Draft Budget. Once we finalize the line items and have an accurate checking account carry over amount, we will submit a final budget to the WY Dept. of Audit. <u>Please note one important change</u> because of the way the DoA wants us to report the Committed Savings Account, we will need to move all of those funds to the checking account at the end of the fiscal year, then move them back to the savings account with the new fiscal year. I can explain this in more detail if there are any questions. It really doesn't change anything substantially. It is just a reporting anomaly.
- TCD FY2020 Audit: I created a Request for Proposals (RFP) for TCD's annual audit for fiscal year 2020. I have received 2 proposals so far, and anticipate at least one more. I have checked and the RFP has been viewed by several entities. We will have a recommended provider at the June 17, 2020 Board Meeting for discussion.
- **FY20 Gaging Station Reimbursement:** I have completed the reimbursement process with Grand Teton National Park (GTNP) for the current fiscal year. TCD has a contract with the United States Geological Survey (USGS) to perform monitoring services at the Moose Gaging Station, along with other locations that TCD pays for. GTNP reimburses TCD the total cost of the monitoring at the Moose location. TCD has contract with both USGS and GTNP to continue the reimbursement arrangement though fiscal years 2021 and 2022.

Information Items:

Program Area: Agriculture

- Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS): NRCS regularly disseminates emails on their programming. TCD traditionally has not developed or employed a coherent strategy to getting that messaging to landowners, or spoken with NRCS on how this could take place. Communication has initiated with NRCS on how they disseminate this, and what support they are requesting of conservation districts.
- **Small Acreage Agriculture:** Sandy Shuptrine reached out to TCD on an opportunity to review county regulations on structures such as high tunnels. Tom and I are cooperating on what role TCD may have in advancing this.
- Agriculture support: Karen Jerger, Rafter J resident, wrote comments (see Supplemental Materials) on the results of improvements to the East Side Ditch. Karen noted no complaints were made by Rafter J residents to the Rafter J office on the subject of water damage or water in crawl spaces, since improvement were completed. Similarly, all residents surveyed indicated either no water, or substantial decreases in the amount of water in crawlspaces. I spent time fulfilling TCD's strategy of having boots on the ground, on agricultural projects. This included running a shovel on a ditch lining, and branding of calves. This was a chance to observe details of implementing improvements, and connect with other ranch managers.
- Small Water Project Program (SWPP): TCD annually writes a one-page document, outlining the process and timelines whereby TCD will consider requests to submit SWPP grants for proponents. The document was revised for this year, and placed on the TCD web site for the first time.
- Fencing Improvements: Met with Jackson Hole Wildlife Foundation (JHWF) staff on the subject of fencing, and the past and future of JHWF and TCD cooperating on agricultual fence improvements. Specific projects, and strategy, were discussed.
- Level I Watershed Study: The Wyoming Water Development Commission's regular meeting included review of applications for Level I Watershed Studies. I sat in on the meeting to represent our Hoback Level I Watershed Study application. The application was approved, setting the stage for additional staff work to support contract development, contractor hiring, and development of the study.
- **Range Management and Monitoring:** University of Wyoming (UW) Extension is hiring a rangelands Extension Educator ????, to be based in Pinedale and serving five counties including Teton. The position will mainly provide educational programming on rangeland management. Previous staff in this position have been key to TCD's programming, and this hiring is significant as UW has a hiring freeze for all positions except 4-H educator positions.
- Wyoming Department of Agriculture (WDA): WDA has quarterly conference calls with Bridger-Teton National Forest range and line officer staff. The calls were set up after WDA felt they were uninformed, as a stakeholder, in decisions. I am in discussion with Chris Wichmann, Manager, WDA Natural Resources & Policy Division, on the opportunity for TCD to join these calls.

Program Area: Restoration and Sustainability

- Wildfire Risk Reduction Program (WRRP):
 - Continuously conducting Wildfire Risk Overviews at residences. Inspecting completed projects. Working on site with landscapers to communicate project goals. Trained our consultant on use of our data collection technology, as well as on our standards via a site visit.
 - Problems stems from a software (AgTerra) update, taking time to troubleshoot.
 - Teton Area Wildfire Protection Coalition is experiencing turnover, with Steve Markason's retirement as North Zone Fire Management Officer from the BTNF, Jenny Kruger's departure from Teton County Emergency Management, and a new public information officer at both the BTNF and GTNP.
 - One of the components of the WRRP is support for neighborhood scale risk reduction. TCD currently offers consulting services to landowners to address risk along road corridors and common spaces, and offers financial support for projects that implement TCD's voluntary recommendations. Two neighborhoods have received financial support through this program, both neighborhoods are continuing project work and have informally inquired into additional financial support. Tom and I support developing a policy to address recurring requests for support. The recommended alternative is to offer a single reimbursement for a neighborhood.

• **Development Reviews**: TCD received zero requests for review of developments from Teton County Planning.

Re: Follow-up on 2019 irrigation season

As I reported to all of you last August, the maintenance work done on the Eastside Ditch during Spring 2019, along with lower water levels in the ditch, seemed to have made a significant improvement in the problem of irrigation water filling crawlspaces on the east side of Rafter J.

Between 2016 and 2018, we had identified 96 homes in our area that had problems with water in crawlspaces during the irrigation season. This information was gathered from online surveys (2016-2018) and a door-to-door survey in 2017.

Last fall we identified 20 houses where seasonal water was either completely absent or substantially lower than in previous years. This information was gathered from the online survey (2019), and informal conversations with neighbors. We did not repeat the door-to-door survey of all households. While the number of online survey responses (12) was disappointing, we suspect that many households did not respond because they no longer had problems. There were no crawlspace water complaints made last summer to the Rafter J office from homeowners on the the E. side of Rafter J.

Again, I would like to thank all parties involved in addressing this problem, and encourage continued routine maintenance and monitoring of the Eastside Ditch, especially as it relates to crawlspace water in Rafter J homes. This seems to be a reasonable approach to guaranteeing water rights, protecting private property, and preventing future conflict.

Program Area: Communications

- Social Media: Authored post on tick-borne illness.
- **Nature Notebook:** Created geospatial animation of Cache Creek for Nature Notebook series. Filmed episode two with Phoebe, focused on green gentian.

Program Area: Wildlife

- Wildlife Capture: We have two guests from the public who would like to present their perspectives on the Wyoming Game and Fish Department's Elk Winter Range Study that TCD has supported each of the past two years. Respectfully, GPS collars enable understanding of habitat permeability, migration timing, route fidelity, and response to human development. Measurement of fat-reserves and fecundity of captured and recaptured animals provides insight into effects of human caused and environmental variables. Formal designations of migration corridors and seasonal ranges now require GPS-collar derived data. Stakeholders participating in land management exercises such as Wyoming Public Lands Initiative, Snow King Expansion, Teton Sheep Project, and Forest Plan Revisions now expect collar data, and view expert opinion as subjective. Primary literature indicates helicopter net-gunning is the safest animal immobilization technique, with approximately 2% capture-caused mortality observed over thousands of events. This includes any mortality of animals within a 2-week window post capture.
- **Sage-Grouse**: High daily count of males on 9 monitored leks in 2020 was 44 males. High in 2019 was 36. Counts observed over the past three years represent a significant decline from the 5-year average, constituting a population-based adaptive management trigger. Local Working Group and Technical Team advanced adaptive management response proposal to translocate grouse from Sublette County to the upper Gros Ventre. Wyoming Game and Fish Department declined to advance the proposal in 2020. Further explanation expected during the June 25, 2020 Sage-Grouse Implementation Team meeting.
- Western Asio flammeus Landscape Study (WAfLs): WAfLS is an eight-state agency and volunteer effort to conduct short-eared owl point counts at the beginning of their breeding season. I surveyed a route between Shadow Mt. and Ditch Creek for the second consecutive year. I detected two northern harriers (WAfLS species of interest) but no owls.
- Amphibians: Met with private landowner to view recently completed wetland restoration project, completed after detecting zero amphibians over three years and six site visits. Landowner is interested in long-term monitoring to determine efficacy. Opportunity for additional restoration if project deemed successful.
- **Deer-Vehicle Collisions**: Wildlife Society Bulletin notified me that my co-authored article *Wildlife warning reflectors and white canvas reduce deer-vehicle collisions and risky road-crossing behavior* was among the top 10% most downloaded papers from 2018 & 2019.

Program Area: Native Plants

• **Teton County Planning:** Conducted site inspection and advised landowners on native species restoration plan.

• Native Seed Mix: Surveying local seed sellers on interest in carrying a TCD approved mix.

Program Area: GIS & Mapping / Information Technology

- Lidar: Responded to two requests for 2015 lidar dataset.
- Aquatic Crossings: Updated aquatic/road crossings identified in 2018 Teton County Wildlife Crossings Master Plan using Surface Water Inventory shapes.
- Wildlife-Vehicle Collisions: Reviewing statistical analyses and results from Elyce for draft manuscript.
- Surface Water Inventory (SWI): Assisted Emergency Management with incorporation of SWI features into <u>Flood Planning Web Application</u>. Continue to receive effusive feedback from agencies, consultants, and the public. Over 1,200 views of <u>TCD SWI Web Application</u> in the past year.
- **Bridger-Teton Wildlife-Recreation**: Finalized attribution of study area trail network with usage classes generated by Chris Owens of Friends of Pathways. Delivered output to Courtney Larson of The Nature Conservancy for use in their collaborative <u>Neighbors to Nature</u> project in Cache Creek.
- **COVID-19:** Received certificate of appreciation from Teton County Emergency Operations Center for outstanding performance during the Wyoming Covid-19 Pandemic.

Program Area: Water Resources

- Septic Effluent Study: Site selection is near complete. A meeting is scheduled for Monday, June 8th, 2020 to identify final sites and establish a plan for well installation.
- Hoback Drinking Water: The final presentation of the Hoback Drinking Water Stakeholder group is scheduled for 10:30am on June 8th, 2020. This will take place at a video conference at a regularly scheduled Teton County Commission meeting.
- Wastewater Budgeting: Teton County Commissioners voted to include line items for Septic System Effluent cost-share with TCD, and for Wastewater Planning, following the unified proposal that was presented at the TCD Board Meeting. Teton County will retain their Wastewater Planning line item within their contingency fund, until the point at which a project scope is defined through a committee effort.
- Airport Groundwater Sampling: The Jackson Hole Airport has completed groundwater sampling for per- and poly-fluoroalkyl substances, also known as PFAS. In February of 2020, 14 monitoring wells on Airport property were tested for PFAS: 5 wells tested positive, and 2 exceeded the US EPA lifetime health advisory level of 70 parts per trillion. Additional sampling, following these results, confirmed the presence of PFAS in one domestic water well downgradient of the airport. PFAS are emerging chemicals of concern as human health effects become better understood. Federal Aviation Administration requires the use of these chemicals in fire extinguishers designed for petroleum fires. The Airport has decided to move forward with free PFAS drinking water testing for residents downgradient of the Airport.
- Special Project Excise Tax (SPET) for Aquatic Crossings: I am working with an aquatic sub-group that is steering the aquatic portion of SPET Wildlife Crossing funds. I have drafted a scope for the sub-group, and am working with Morgan to update crossings, to include new features from the Surface Water Inventory.
- Flat Creek Sediment Sampling: I continue to take sediment samples from Flat Creek for the ongoing USGS sediment study in Flat Creek.
- Gros Ventre River Flooding: On June 1st and 2nd, 2020, snowmelt runoff on the Gros
 - Ventre River overtopped the newly constructed bank armoring and haul road on the southeast side of the Gros Ventre bridge at HWY 89, flooding the pathway. Inhibiting overtopping flows and reducing pathway flooding were primary design elements of the project. Ditches on both the north and

south side of the Gros Ventre were put at risk during this flooding event.

This particular episode was made at the request of the Jackson Hole Weed Management Association/Teton County Weed & Pest to be shown in 4th grade classrooms in place of the cancelled annual Wildlife Expo event. Future episodes will be shorter and will be shared on social media regularly.

Program Area: Water

• JH Clean Water Coalition: 1) Much of my time this month was spent administering the new Trout Friendly Landscaper & Business program. We had 16 businesses donate to the JH Clean Water Coalition and become certified to deliver Trout Friendly landscaping services. 2) We received an order of 55 new Trout Friendly signs. I have planned locations for most of the signs and will be delivering them over the next couple of weeks.

Program Area: Restoration & Sustainability

• Wildfire Risk Reduction Program: I created a flyer at Robb's request to help promote available TCD funding for neighborhood-scale wildlife risk reduction projects.
